- 7 A vase and bowl recycled within the hour!
















## Swimming in the mud

I'm halfway through reading Judy Hamilton's book "Glory Days, Brisbane's Art World to 1970", at which point Brisbane's Art education and sales appear to be struggling. As my search for formal ceramic education continues, I feel not much has changed. Learning is still found in the back alleys of generous community groups, and now the deep dark web. Maybe the book will end on a more positive note. Maybe the current level of interest in ceramics will influence a reinstation of Creative Arts courses. Then things would all be peachy.

In the meantime, I have found the Potters round Table from Washington Street Studios to be a great resource. After a year and a half, I'm assessing my results more critically.

Podcasts - "Tips for making professional looking pottery", and "Critiquing your own work" are

exceptionally well presented by the late Phil Berneburg. The focus is on technical aspects because as he said, even if you don't like an "artistic style"

of a piece, the professionalism is recognisable.

I had fun smashing a few pieces that were substandard. Some shards will be useful samples on my test totem.
