The pointy end of my wheel

Recent descriptions of issues with my wheel usually end with "it's probably something I'm doing". It's random and usually after longer sessions (which are infrequent).

My right hand man short circuited Claude's suggestion to test electrics, ground off rusted screws and horror of horrors it was a rubber mosh pit party in there.

Rubber confetti all around the walls and in the engine. Photos after he vacuumed.

Welcoming suggestions other than trip to Clay shed or letting my handy man with no wheel fixing experience have at it.

A day in my studio

Throwing and trimming

A variety of clays are thrown depending on the mood of the day.

There are 2 buckets beside the wheel - one with clean water and the second to clean up tools etc at the end of the day. A smaller container is on the wheel for throwing.

A fresh block of clay is a delight whereas recycled clay is more frugal. Though I have noticed some bought clay can be unworkable - hard to even cut with a wire let alone wedge/knead for throwing - and needs a lot of processing to use - boo!

I throw on bats on pads of clay. At the end of the session this pad is then wedged and thrown as a small bud vase - they make good kiln fillers! Time is always made to clean up the wheel and tools after every session

Pieces are thrown on one day and then left to dry overnight. In really wet weather - hear that Alfie! - it can take days to be sufficiently leather hard to trim.

Decorating

I like to decorate on bone dry clay.

For a clay that is not white I apply multiple thin layers of white slip (JB1) that helps to show colours/glazes work at their best.

Base decorating is generally with fine brushwork. I use a mixture of iron and cobalt with brushing medium and water.

The base art can then be coloured using stains - either brushed or airbrushed. It works like watercolour - transparent and mixable.

Recycling

Any clay left over from a day's throwing is immediately recycled. I have a plastic crate with a constant supply of ends! As all clays used are suitable for mid-fire there is no issue with firing the recycled clay to cone 6.

I use an old piece of heavy cotton cloth to line a plaster mould (the cloth prevents the clay coming in contact with the plaster) to recycle over a couple of days.

Glazing and firing

All pieces are first bisqued, when absolutely dry, to cone 06. Glazing will take up a whole session - 1.5 to 2 hours!

As most of my work is decorated I usually only need a clear glaze. A Cesco/Walkers clear with a wide range from earthenware to mid-fire is ideal. It always needs to be sieved beforehand and watered down before use. It can be watered down so that when you dip in a finger it is just coated with glaze. It then tends to dry very quickly when brushed on allowing for 3 layers in quick succession.



Special glazes such as Mayco are used sparingly as a feature - sometimes leaving the fired clay bare and just glazing the top!

Most work now is mid-fired - cheaper than stoneware and more resilient than earthenware.
