Our Glaze Dots workshop

Basic Introduction to Glazes

Some basic notes from Lyn's workshop on this Saturday, 14 March

The four basic components of a glaze are:

1. THE GLASSFORMER: Silica (which melts at 1710C)

- a. This is far too high for ceramic kilns.
- b. Too much silica causes glaze to become too stiff
- c. Too little silica causes glaze to run off the pot.

2. STABLISERS:

The refractory (the stiffening agent)

- a. Keeps glaze from running off the pot.
- b. Kaolin, Ball clay, Alumina or Talc are some examples of stiffeners.

TEMPERATURES

Common firings

- a. BISQUE CONE 06 (980-1000°C)
- b. EARTHENWARE- CONE 03 (1080-1100°C)
- c. MIDFIRE CONE 6 (1180-1220°C)
- d. STONEWARE CONE 10 (1280-1300°C)

(It's important to match glazes to firing temp)

3. FLUXES:

Help lower the melting point of the glass

 a. Gerstley borate (prevents crazing), bone ash, Nepheline Syenite, Whiting/Calcite, sodium, soda ash, frits and potash feldspar are some examples of fluxes.

4. COLOURANTS: Metal oxides (the beautifiers)

- a. Usually toxic so don't use on tableware.
- Red Iron Oxide (browns),
 Copper Carbonate Turquoise (goes red in reduction),
 Cobalt Carb is finer (comes out as blues.),
 Magnesium Dioxide (black/browns),
 Chrome (yellow/greens.),
 Chromium Oxide (red/yellow/pinks/greens).
 - Manganese (blue/purple), adding rutile gives different effects, and more.

Important note: Make sure your clay temp and glaze temp match the selected firing.











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
